



Protecting Fall Bulbs from Squirrels

Squirrels love to dig up freshly planted bulbs — especially tulips and crocuses. Luckily, with a few simple tricks, you can enjoy beautiful spring blooms without feeding the local wildlife!

Choosing the Right Bulbs

- Less appealing to squirrels: Daffodils, alliums, hyacinths, fritillaria, and snowdrops. These are beautiful options and unpalatable to squirrels.
- More likely to be dug up: Tulips and crocuses (use extra protection when planting these).











Planting Strategies

- Plant later in the season: Plant bulbs later in the fall (late October-early November), when soil is cool and squirrels are less active. This gives bulbs time to root before winter, while avoiding peak digging season.
- Disguise disturbed soil: Smooth and cover with mulch so squirrels don't notice fresh digging.
- Mix plantings: Combine tasty tulips with daffodils or alliums to deter nibbling.

Physical Barriers

- Chicken wire or bulb cages: Place mesh over bulbs before covering with soil/mulch. Roots and shoots grow through, but squirrels can't dig in.
- Garden netting: Lay across the soil surface after planting until the ground freezes.

Repellents & Deterrents

- Natural repellents: Sprinkle blood meal, bone meal, or pelletized hen manure over the planting area. Hen manure is also a natural fertilizer, and will help deter rabbits in the spring!
- Commercial repellents: Safe, animal-deterrent sprays are available. Reapply after rain.
